BOOK REPORT:

SEW SPECIAL FAT QUARTER GIFTS, edited by Julie Johnson #217

A hardcover, spiral bound book of gifts to make for family, friends or venues, this book is another treasure trove of ideas and includes 64 patterns of 'quick and easy designs'. The good part about it is that you won't need yardage for these projects - all are created from fat quarters!

Yes, some of the projects are small and just take a few quarters, while others take many to complete the design. I actually believe that many of the projects in this book ARE easy – simple ideas that we perhaps have thought of but just haven't had the inspiration or 'push' to do like decorating towels, or making some 'groovy' pillows for the family room, or even to go with that new quilt that you have just completed. Of course the new fabrics used, and the colour photos are so delightful – I

saw a quilt on display in Huckleberrys and it used some of the fabrics illustrated in this book

So, on with the contents: Sew Sweet Baby section takes us on a journey to create bibs, crayon holders, a very simple but eye-catching quilt using 5 ½ inch squres, a matching tote, baby announcement board, playmat, stuffie using yo-yos and more.

The Comforts of Home features directions for a very easy pinwheel quilt, pillow designs, two scrappy rag quilts, and shows how to use striped fabric for a pleasing effect. All of these quilt patterns are suitable for real beginners as well as for the more experienced quilters.

Bags and More is an extensive section of 30 pages that contains patterns for almost any type of bag that you can think of - for jewelry, gifts, wine, drawstring type, some petite purses, travel bags etc. There is even a pattern for a patchwork backpack. And they all look wonderful! So, bag-lovers, you

In the Heart of the Home section. patterns include adorable aprons, oven mitts. coasters, tea cozies. cookie trays (yes,

that is

right), bread bags, table runners, reversible basket covers, book jacket covers great for journals, gift boxes, pincushions and much more!

In conclusion, I think that this book will be great for anyone that loves fabric and want to use up all those delightful scraps or fat quarters for those gifts. Just think – this book may solve all your Christmas shopping problems because as we all know, a handmade gift is right from the heart and very much appreciated!

QUILTER PROFILE: Norma McNeillie

This month when I arrived at Norma and Keith's, I was greeted by the tantalizing aroma of fresh muffins and a wonderful walk down art galleryhallways hung with West Coast artifacts. We spent an enjoyable afternoon discussing Norma's career as a Home Economist and teacher, as well as her retirement activities with our guild.

Norma is one of the few members of our guild who was born here. As she stated, "I was born in Comox (my mother was, too, one of five children born to Mary Pidcock and "Cougar"Smith) but we moved to

West Vancouver when I was about one. Our Comox house, which my Dad built, still stands on Church Street. My paternal grandfather, Rev. A.W. Corker, was a minister at St. Peter's Anglican Church, which is why the hall is named after him."

In 1968, Norma tells us, she finished her degree in Home Economics at UBC and then took summer school classes for her teaching diploma. After six years teaching in Coquitlam, she travelled to Germany to teach there. "That was in 1974. I met my hus-

band Keith there, and then relocated to Regina, where I taught for a year and a half. When our two boys were born, I stayed home with them until 1990."

Although Norma was experienced at sewing, she had not quilted before the late '80s, when she took her first quilt course. "I made a sampler quilt, hand quilted, which I gave to my Dad for his afternoon naps. This year I donated it to We Care. I made it before rotary cutters and all the great timesavers of the day. But from 1990, when I went back teaching, until 2001, I had very little time to quilt or sew or *anything*! I did take the odd class – they were pretty few and far between. I made my second quilt in about 2000. It is in blue and white,



and the pinwheel pattern. I knew very little about quilts, but forged ahead, finding out later that the batt I used was probably not the best choice,

AND I machine quilted it too far apart. How to make the border was a mystery, too, so I used up the mirror image pieces from the quilt and tacked them on as the border. It's still my favourite quilt."

When asked about her membership in the guild, Norma replied, "I joined the guild in 2001, but I was still doing some substitute teaching here, so I didn't get too involved until a couple of years later. Dorothy encouraged me to put some things in the venue sale. She said, 'Just meet us down at Nautical Days!' and she was so nice to us all. I really enjoyed the experience. It allowed me to use up fabric, try new patterns and techniques and *not* overburden friends and family with 'stuff!' It also allows me to recoup some of my costs, so I could try more new things, and so I can 'play' some more! I am most interested in quilted items that are useful – that I can see an end use for. I do sew things for the sale, but I like to use up little bits, and I try to have something different each time."

"After one of the sales, Dorothy asked me to organize the venue for the next Nautical Days, because she had overseen it for long enough. After holding that one sale, we all decided that a committee dedicated to venue sales was needed, and I was happy to help with that for a couple of years. Years ago, when I was home with the boys, I got involved in many craft sales, making whatever was selling that year. When I went back teaching, I got involved with more of the same, raising money for the Home Ec program, so I had a lot of experience with sales venues."

"Doing the venue here was really great. At our first meeting, we talked about what we wanted for the

venue. We wanted it to be self-supporting, and talked about props, organization, and so on. The guild generously gave us \$1000.00, which we soon paid back with fees from sales at the Filberg Festival."

"After my term, we strong-armed June Boyle into taking it over, and now Margaret is heading it. So, it's been good for the guild and good for members putting their quilting into the venue sales. I think we did a great job of setting down goals and instituting practices that allowed their completion. I know we are now self-supporting, and I'm very happy we have had such able people doing this work in the past few years."



"Over the years, I have been aware that people join the guild for a number of reasons. I think these differences are what makes our guild interesting. If members are there and they're doing machine work, hand stitching, knitting, beading, or what-

> ever, I think that's great. It's stimulating. I take hand work because I like going around to see what everybody's doing. We see things and say, 'Oh gee, I'd like to try making one of these.' Recently, Gail Tellett shared her fabric-wrapped clothesline creations. That kept

me busy trying that new idea for at least a week!"

What does Norma do when not quilting? She tells us, "I spend my time cooking, gardening, going to Aquacize four times a week, reading, and hand stitching. I was amazed – a family friend once asked, 'Did I sew

very often?' and I replied, 'Everyday!' (or almost). Keith says I always seem to like the labourintensive projects, and it's true. I like hand work. I have learned to knit in the past few years (thanks to my friends Prue Russell, Gladi Lyall, and Verna Powers) and I always have a small project on the go. Each year I try to give the hospital auxiliary one or two items. Last year it was a quilted bag and a lap quilt. This year it was a baby quilt. And I am also a devoted cook – again because I am always wanting to try new things."

Norma's studio doubles as their office and sitting room. An eye-catching floral quilt hangs strategically on her studio wall, and on her studio sofa are an appliqued cushion of her cat ("All I have left of her") alongside her Double Irish Chain lap quilt. Norma's present work shows how much she likes Nancy Halvorson and McKenna Ryan patterns— a fused and appliqued Birdhouse wall hanging, a couple of applique patterns waiting to start, tea towels to which she will add her own touch

Norma states, "I am very much a homebody and enjoy my own space and company, but I love the Schoolhouse guild for the companionship, inspiration, and ability to be somewhere else where I am comfortable. I am constantly amazed at the variety and depth of experiences that our fellow quilters share."

When asked what her most difficult project has been, Norma answers, "It was the New York Beauty quilt for my son Blair and his wife Gabby. The quilt was a labour of love, and I am very proud of it. My next big project will be a similar quilt for my son Dan and his wife Elisha. I have made several rag quilts for them, but I want to give them a keepsake quilt now that the two grandchildren are older. After taking a class from Gail Tellett and June James on English paper piecing, I began a Dresden Plate quilt. It has a decided old-fashioned look, so I'm hand quilting it all. I am really enjoying the experience!"

"One of my future projects is some sort of salmon wall hanging. I want to incorporate realistic fish with the West Coast native designs. My Dad was in the fishing business, and we spent every summer in Alert Bay. As a consequence, we have a great appreciation for West Coast Native art, and we're lucky enough to have several carved pieces. I think this quilted piece will be a fond remembrance of Dad and his career."

Every month, when I spent time visiting one of our guild members, I come away with ideas for improving my own quilting. And as I drove home from Norma's (in glorious sunshine, for a change), I found myself thinking about her very small stash. I would be willing to bet that, even with several projects in preparation, Norma still has one of the smallest stashes in the Valley. This means to me that when Norma needs fabric for a quilt, she is not digging through stale and outdated fabric, but instead is buying cotton in current designs and colours. Certainly one philosophy of stash collection. So thank you, Norma, for welcoming me into your beautiful home and studio, and for giving me one more quilting tip. EB

The Guild provides these sales as an opportunity for Guild members to make and sell their guilts and guilted items. These items must be good quality as they represent the work of our Guild. This is a good opportunity to use some of your fabric and talent and make some money. Small and reasonably priced items tend to sell best but some larger items sell as well. We encourage all guild members to participate, if they are interested. as the more items we have in the sale, the more interesting our booth will be.

A fee of \$5.00 is charged by the Guild for the first 10 items that you enter into the sale. \$10.00 is charged for more than 10 items. The Guild receives 10% of the money earned by each item that is sold.

If you are interested in entering some items into any of these sales, please contact Shirley Woodbeck. Shirley has the price tickets that are to be attached to your quilted item. She also has the forms where the items are to be listed. If you are entering items into a sale, it is expected that you will do a volunteer shift at the sale. It is also appreciated if you can help with set-up and take-down.

The Charles Dickens Sale requires that work entered into their sale be juried by the Charles Dickens organizers. Therefore we need three pictures that are representative of the work that you will be entering into the sale. These pictures need to get to Shirley as soon as possible.



A Poem for Patchworkers

But times' unimportant, we don't heed clocks
We just need fabric and a sewing box
Our project awaits us, now we proceed
This must be Heaven – what more do we need?

CREATIVITY RECIPE

Ingredients for being Creative:
Creativity itself is easy to find
All it takes is a willing hand and mind
Start with some cloth, and a needle and thread
And perhaps some scraps stuffed under the bed
Mix with talent and true dedication
And just for good measure apply concentration
Blend this together in a room that's a mess
And you've unleashed creativeness

1/2 a MONTH of TIPS from Fons and Porter

May 1st - to make the elusive notch in a spool of thread easy to find, mark the notch with a permanent marker before removing the thread from the notch the first time.

May 2nd - Protect the tips of your scissors with a length of vinyl tubing from your local hardware store. May 3rd - Make yourself a thimble with an inverted top by using an inverted wide headed nail. Place the head of the nail on the top of the thimble. Tap the point of the nail gently with a hammer to form a depression in the top of the thimble.

May 4th - Use a small piece of tape wrapped around your finger, sticky side out, to remove stray threads left after ripping out a seam.

Half a MONTH of TIPS Cont'd -

May 5 - Pin a small, zipper type plastic bag to your quilt to store your thread, small scissors, and other notions to keep them from wandering away between hand quilting sessions.

May 6th - For a comfortable, tight fit, coat the inside of your thimble with "sticky stuff" used for sorting papers. A thin coating of rubber cement will give the same result.

May 7th - For appliqué or embroidery work, keep multiple needles threaded with all the colours you need. You'll save time and thread. May 8th - Write the size and type of machine needle you are currently using and the date you began using it on a small piece of masking tape and stick it to the side of your machine. Remember to use the correct type and size of needle for the job at hand and to change the machine needles frequently.

May 9th - Dental Floss threaders make great needle threaders for embroidery floss or yarn. (ED: also make good needle threaders for SERGERS!)

May 10th - Strips of self adhesive sandpaper from the hardware store make great non-slip aids for your rotary cutting rulers. Cut narrow strips and place them on the underside of your ruler.

May 11th - To create a 1/4 inch seam guide for machine piecing, use sticky-backed mole foam cut in a narrow strip and positioned to guide your fabric at the correct seam width. The thickness of the mole foam creates a ridge that the fabric slides along.

May 12th - To make a thimble fit more snugly and comfortably, wear a rubber finger tip under the thimble. Cut the band off the rubber finger tip so it fits just below your knuckle.

May 13th - Use an empty boutique style tissue box as a portable waste container. It's pretty, portable, and can be at your fingertips. Even if it is accidently tipped over, the contents will not spill easily.

May 14th - If you find a flaw in your fabric, mark it with a small brass safety pin, piece of masking tape, or stick on label to remind you to avoid the flaw when cutting.
