

President's Message

I often wonder, "where did my love of fabric come from"? It's always felt like it's been a part of me. I remember how my mom would go to night school when I was just a little girl, learning how to sew. She would make us matching outfits, and we were always going to fabric stores, looking, touching, dreaming. The feel of fabric in my hands became something familiar and comforting. We'd plan what we were going to make next, and even as a child, I was hooked.

I learned to sew in school and back then it was actually part of the curriculum! And in my early 20s, I enrolled in the Helen Lefeaux School of Design in Vancouver, dreaming of becoming a fashion designer.

But shortly before school started, I got pregnant with my first son, and life gently nudged me in a different direction. Still, the love of fabric stayed with me. I kept sewing, took classes along the way, and then—I discovered quilting. I took my first quilting class in the mid-nineties and never looked back.

It wasn't until I was about 10 years old that I met my grandmother. She was a Mennonite living in Russia, and after my parents found her, they brought her to Canada. My grandmother always sewed. It was how she survived after the war, by sewing for others. When she came to Canada, she made quilts and donated them through her church.

So maybe that's where it all came from. Maybe it's in my blood, passed down through generations of women who stitched their lives together with fabric, thread, and love.

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





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Small Quilts

Vanessa - Ann Collection
Published by Oxmoor House 1989
Guild Library # 49







We are fortunate to have "Small Quilts" from the Vanessa - Ann Collection. This book is a compilation of thirty small quilts designed by eight different designers. The quilts range from pieced to appliqued (or a combination) as well as stenciled and pieced, perhaps with a bit of embroidery added.

None of the quilts are even the size of a large baby quilt but each is 'fresh' in appearance and calls out to be hung on a wall or put in a large picture frame. These are not miniature quilts, but simply small quilts which would also look nice as table toppers or perhaps draped on the arm of a sofa. The intention of this book is to open your imagination to possibilities of combining fabric and buttons, color and trims, to create small works of art.

Each project lists the size of quilt, number of blocks and required materials. Color photos are inspirational, and printed patterns can easily be cut with a rotary cutter. Assembly is clearly described, down to how the designer quilted each project.

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Spring is, we hope, right around the corner, and spring quilts such as Pastel Tulips (pg. 34) or Springtime Stencil (pg. 56) seem to echo feelings of new beginnings. Summer quilts like Summer Flowers (pg 97) and In Full Bloom (pg 108) reflect the warmth and color of this season.

For a taste of fall, how about Autumn Leaves (pg 92) or Harvest (pg 103)? Harvest uses flat buttons to embellish the quilt giving a 3D effect. And winter - both Fir Trees (pg 60) and O'Christmas Tree (pg 87) are projects for the Christmas season. Interspersed between these seasonal quilts are many more intriguing designs.

Quick quilts and more elaborate quilts are all here to offer inspiration. Rather than spending a lot of money on new fabric for a queen size bed quilt, these projects require little fabric and hopefully less time to create. This may be a super break from projects which seem to take years of energy and money to produce. With spring arriving soon, perhaps a small project is just the thing to get those creative juices flowing!

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Have you heard ???

President's Challenge this year is the "HST"

(half square triangle – one of the most common, most versatile quilt blocks). What is your favorite layout for these? – stars? chevrons? flying geese? – or are you ready to try some new layout? Do you have a preferred method for trimming these to size? Sometimes, the options seem unlimited.

To Enter this year's President Challenge:

Register with Gayle Hampton – cost is \$ 5.00. If you complete your project by June, your \$ 5. is returned - --- but, if you don't – the money goes to Community Quilts

Use your scrap HST's from previous projects – or make new ones

Any size project will be accepted – as long as the main focus is HST (although you can include other blocks in your layout)

The Library has many MANY books / patterns to provide options and ideas for you.

Books can be signed out for 1 month periods – if you need to keep it longer, then please return it to ensure no one else has requested it – and then sign it out again.

To request a book – there are small post-it notes on the cupboard door – write your name on it and then stick it to the card in the sign out book

If you return a book and find a request on your sign out card – please let the person waiting know that you've returned it.

If you don't know how to sign books in / out of Library, just ask another Guild member of the process.

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Community Quilts

L'Arche Comox Valley

Representatives from L'Arche Comox Valley attended our meeting in February to tells us about the programs they provide. They have 10 "live-in residents" as well as providing many activities to folks still living with family in the Valley. A request was received for 10 quilts – for the beds of those who live-in. This request was approved – and quilts have now been delivered to them. Thank you to all who contribute to Community Quilts and this project.

Fidget Mats

We have received a request from Ocean Front Village (that new facility at 29th & Cliffe). The Recreation Manager for the long term care area is looking for activities that the residents can connect with. Touch is one of the biggest senses that residents use - and fidget blankets are a wonderful way to present that.

The ideal fidget blanket is lap size (think large placement or Fat Quarter Size) – and have multiple types of fabrics, textures, etc. – but these must be **securely fastened** – and items that can be washed or wiped clean.

Bold patterns and prints are visually appealing to residents who may be experiencing cognitive decline or vision loss. Some residents like to find patterns like an 'eye-spy' game with some fabrics – pockets, buckles, ribbons are usually well received. Some gentlemen, though – who may be intrigued by them sometimes avoid trying these if patterns or materials are too feminine – so it would be great if some of our 'creations' have a more masculine options to engage those who are not immediately drawn to pops of colour.

A short discussion was held at the April meeting - and since the request is

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only for 12 of these, there was enough interest to proceed with this request. We all have lots of creative abilities, even though this is not usually what we apply those skills to. We hope to be able to fulfil this request by end of June.

Raelene will be doing a demo about making Fidget Mats soon – so read her Workshop Report. Hope you attend this session and see how easy and fun these are to make.
